INTRODUCTION

Italy was among the 11 founder members of IUPsyS in Stockholm in 1951 and is eager to host an International Congress on behalf of IUPsyS.

Italy is the country with the third highest number of psychologists. There are 31 public and private Universities which offer graduate masters and 35 academic courses offering undergraduate programs. The largest faculty of psychology is in Rome, La Sapienza University. There are also three private universities, Lumsa, Università Pontificia Salesiana, and European University.

I.N.P.A. (Italian Network of Psychologists' Associations) is the most representative organization of Italian Psychologists and includes these Associations: CNOP (National Chamber of Psychologists) with 80,000 professional members, AIP (Italian Psychology Association) with 850 academic members, FISSP (Federation of Psychological Scientific Societies) with 6,000 members, AUPI (The Trade Union representing 5,500 head psychologists working in the NHS).

SCIENTIFIC PROGRAMME

Scientific Committee and Congress issues

We live in extraordinary times, although difficult. One cannot say how the world will look like in 8 years from now, due to the speed and variety of changes occurring every day. Nor can one say what the status of Psychological Science and Practice will be, due to the tremendous progress of knowledge and technology and the growing demands of psychological competences.

It is likely 2020 will need a better psychology, able to meet the challenges of a broader, diverse and inclusive society.

As societies must learn how to capitalize on human capital if they are to prosper and flourish in a rapidly changing world, psychology should be ready to play a crucial role in promoting the mental capital and the proper attitudes that are needed to sustain and to put scientific and economic progress at the service of individuals' development and happiness. This should lead to acknowledging and strengthening individuals' capacities to actualize their own potentials and to fully contribute to societies welfare.

This will require a strong commitment to values that are mostly compatible with the economic growth of nations and the psychological growth of people.

Building on a Renewed Humanism the Conference wants to be a place of public discussion, reflection and elaboration around focal values and topics where it is possible to assess the contribution of psychological research to the advancement of knowledge and to the functioning of societies.

To realize this aim special emphasis will be given to analysis of the commitment of Psychology to building a Just world where every person should be granted the fair

opportunities and the self respect that are needed to grow and live a good life.

From this perspective the International Congress will address the Renaissance of Psychology inviting its many disciplines, practices and expertises to focus on topics that are indispensable to the achievement of a better humanity such as health, education, integration, equity, economic growth, innovation, peace.

The main Psychological Societies will be invited to designate their representative to deliver a State of the Art Address in accordance with the ethos of the Congress.

Likewise conveners will be encouraged to bring their contributions to symposia most able to combine the best of science and practice and to bring together under the above topics people from diverse disciplines and research traditions.

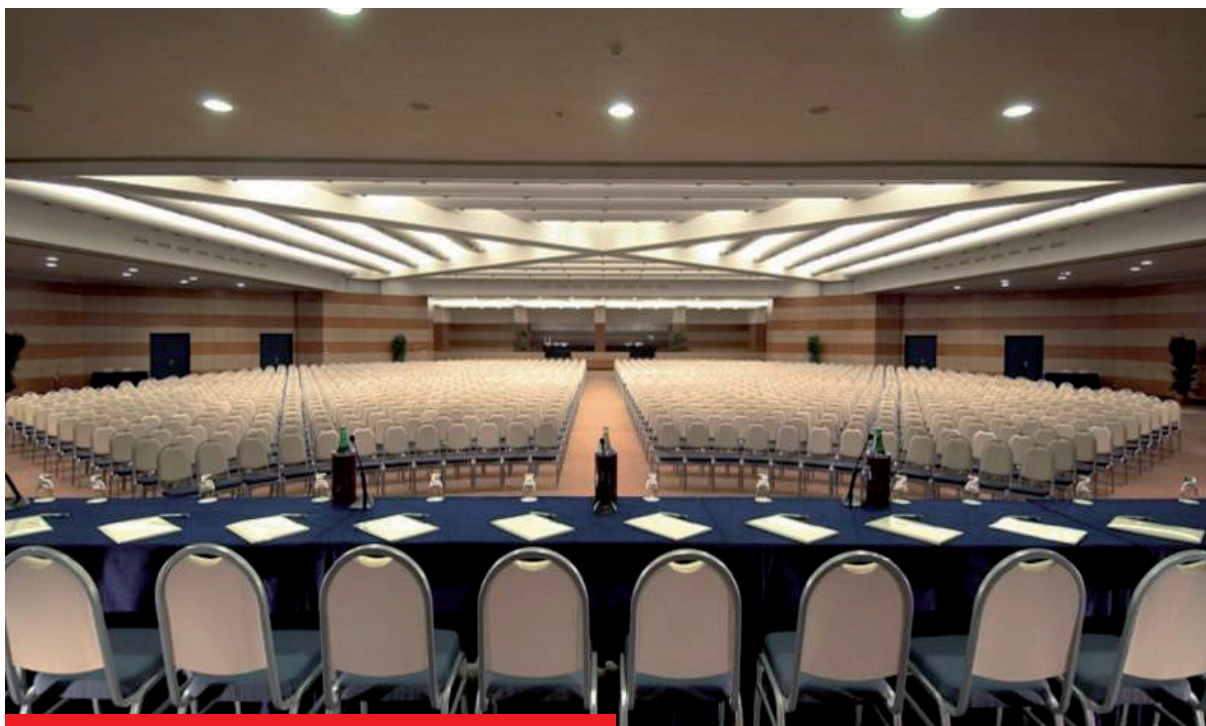
The Congress will last for five days. Renowned scientists will be invited as speakers and symposia conveners. The Program will include opening and closing plenary lectures, keynote lectures daily, thematic oral sessions, and interactive poster sessions.

The suggested venue is located in the city: the Ergife Palace Hotel was opened in 1980 and was restored in 2011. Today the Ergife Palace Hotel is one of the largest in Italy with capacity for up to 5,000 people. The Ergife Palace Hotel can accommodate 1,300 people in 704 rooms; 40 modular conference rooms are available.

The opening ceremony will be held at the Auditorium Parco della Musica with 5,000 seats. The ordinary registration fee will include: scientific works, welcome reception, congress material (congress kit, badge, abstract, CD-rom), attendance certificate, admission to exhibition.

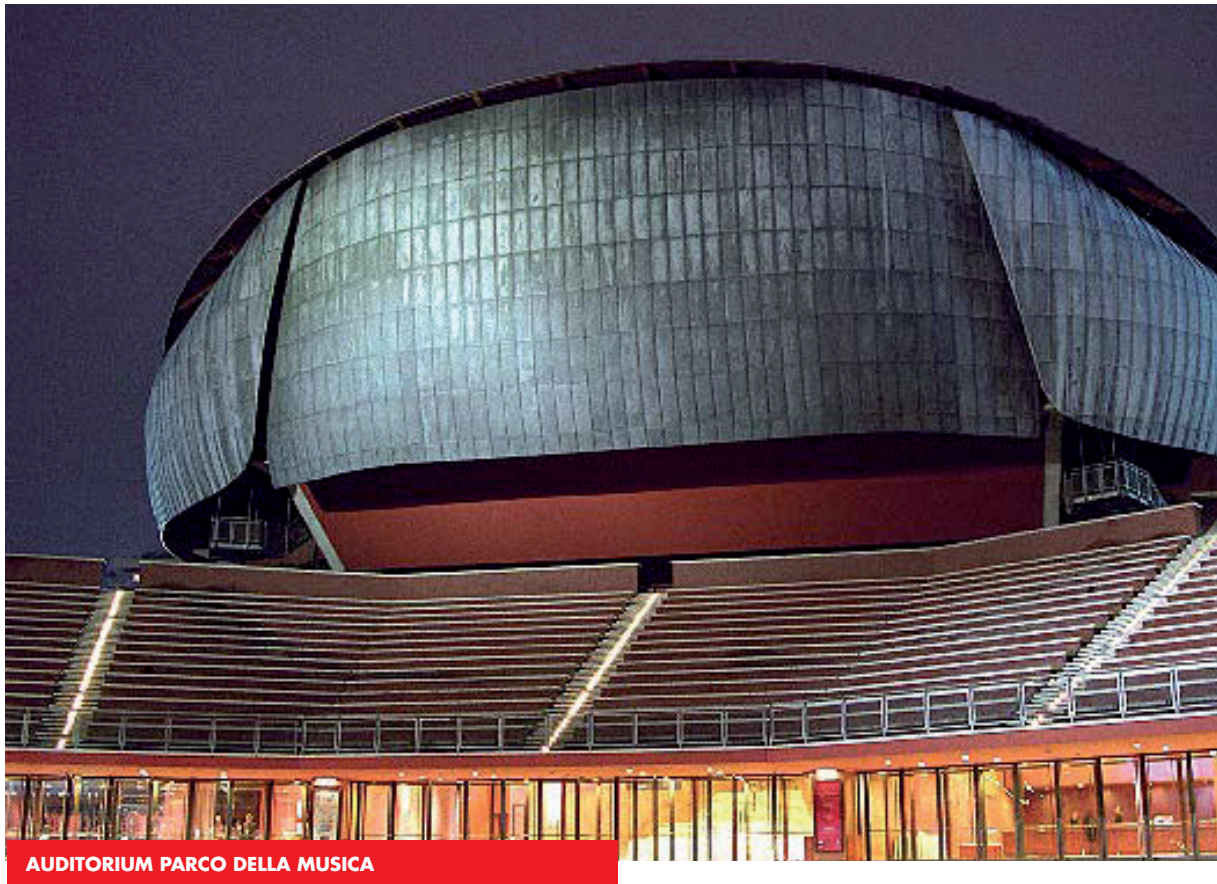

THE CITY OF ROME

Rome is a city full of History, Art and Science, the ideal meeting point where to gather scientists from different cultures, faith and knowledge traditions to attest to the contribution of Psychological Sciences to a better world under common values of respect and justice.

Rome is a multistate capital. The Vatican is located within its territory, most Countries have their Embassy in Rome and the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations has its headquarters in Rome.

Rome is a Capital of Science too since it hosts the most Prestigious Academies of Science, major national Research Centers, and over 10 Universities covering all kinds of disciplines

and degrees. La Sapienza University, the largest in Europe, founded in the 14th century, is among the oldest Universities in the World, and among the most prestigious for teaching and research.

One can appreciate the perfect combination of antiquities and modernities just by walking through Rome. It is like being in an open air museum where archaeological sites mix with Medieval quarters, Renaissance fountains, baroque churches and post modern architecture.

Rome's attractions include exhibitions of any kind for any taste, Villas and Parks, sophisticated hotels and Restaurants, glamorous fashion streets, theatres and concerts. A vast range of prices for accommodation and meals will be made available, including various options suitable for young scientists and people coming from less affluent countries.

July will be ideal to enjoy Rome and Italy with average temperatures between 25 and 35°C, with very low probability of rain.

The proposed congress venues are provided with air conditioning systems.

ACCESS TO THE CITY

All roads lead to Rome as it is easily accessible from any country through Europe, by highways, railroads and planes.

High speed trains connect Rome to Milan and Venice in less than 3 hours, Florence and Naples in less than 90 minutes.

Many low-cost flights and railways arrangements make travel inexpensive from most countries

The Leonardo Da Vinci International Airport is located about 28 km from Rome and well connected to the City Center and Main train stations.

Likewise the airport of Ciampino, serving a number of low-cost airlines is well connected to the City Center.

The ERGIFE PALACE HOTEL, the venue of the congress, is served by underground lines (line 3) and a bus service running a frequent service to Rome Centre. Walking distance from Ergife to Vatican and Center of Rome is no more than 30 minutes.

There are 150 FLIGHT COMPANIES WITH FLIGHTS TO ROME.

Free circulation of scientists

Italy adheres to the ICSU principles of free circulation of scientists. As a member of the European Community it signed Resolution 1551 (19 April 2007) which guarantees that any scientist, from whatever country, will be allowed to enter the country without special requirements, except for the regular passport and visa requirements.
